ABOUT THE PERFORMANCE

"Enmity" renegotiates the role of fragmentation to diasporic subjectivity, complicating the recuperative impulse of the diasporic subject to enliven displaced stories, peoples, and affinities through family history.

Tracing the affective resonances of familial estrangement, loss, and grief, this piece navigates the indeterminacy of (patri)lineage through a first-person narrative, focusing on several moments of rupture through which fracture and alienation materialize as an inheritance of their own.

Questioning the symbolic function of family history to diasporic identity, "Enmity" invites the viewer to consider what can be made of a family that is damned.
